The final report the 'PHSSR- Partnership for Health Systems Sustainability and Resilience' in Portugal was presented at the CCB on the 7th December. This work was carried out by a team from Universidade de Lisboa and Professors Mónica Oliveira (IST), Ana Vieira (IST), and Matilde Pacheco (an ISEG alumna) were involved, as well myself.

The COVID-19 pandemic emphasised the need to carry out reforms in health systems with the objective to improve their sustainability and resilience. The PHSSR was created in 2020 as a joint initiative of the London School of Economics, the World Economic Forum, and Astrazeneca. It currently counts on various other partners in almost 30 countries, where a conceptual model for analysing the sustainability and resilience of health systems is being applied, based on seven domains of analysis, namely: governance, financing, human resources, medicines and technologies, the delivery of care, public health, and the impact on the environment.



In Portugal, the aim of the work carried out was to identify the strengths and weaknesses of the Portuguese health system in each of these seven areas, as well as promote dialogue between the different key players and experts I order to reach a consensus regarding policy recommendations. 11 experts were involved in the design and drafting of the recommendations, and 37 experts collaborated in the participatory Web-Delphi process for evaluating the recommendations, from which 43 emerged recommendations with a generalised consensus, for improving our health system.

This work started a little over a year ago, in partnership with Astrazeneca, Phillips, and KPMG. It was challenging and intense but very rewarding work and was a demanding and learning experience, with a remarkable result. We managed to compile in one single document an extensive set of evidence and statistical data that identifies the strengths and weaknesses of the Portuguese health system, as well as determine a series of policy recommendations with unquestionable consensus among the experts for the seven areas under analysis. We are convinced that we have created a work tool that adds value for policy makers and that we have also contributed to the necessary and indispensable discussion about those measures and policies that have a great potential for improving the sustainability and resilience of our health system, whose anchor is the NHS. Naturally, it falls on me to invite you to read the report, which is available online with open access.



ISEG's Confidence Index for November 2022 regarding the short-term evolution of Portuguese economic activity, registered a value of 35.8, which represents a stablisation in the level of confidence in comparison to the previous month, when the value was the same. In year-on-year terms, the percentage variation of the index was -5.5%.


SOCIUS researchers distinguished with the António **Dornelas Prize**
